For example, we use a tiered approach:

focusing on 3 areas of activity that are most effective at narrowing the attainment gap.

This tiered approach at Thorner's combines:

- staff development to improve teaching targeted academic support
- small group tuition
- wider strategies that support readiness to learn (such as Breakfast Club)

The **aim** is to ensure:

- > That attendance of the disadvantaged pupils is at least in line with that of the other pupils in our care
- During Lockdown every disadvantaged child has access to high quality IT software and hardware (via the DFE scheme)
- > During Lockdown every disadvantaged child's online attendance is at least in line with that of other pupils in our care
- that the progress of the disadvantaged pupils is at least in line with that of the other pupils in our care
- > improved self-esteem, confidence and emotional stability
- > improved participation in school based activities
- > improved participation in extra-curricular and enrichment activities.

The impact:

- √ improved rates of progress:
- in summer 2022, 50% of Yr 6 disadvantaged pupils achieved ARE in their KS2 assessments.
- in summer 2021, disadvantaged pupils attained at or above average (ARE) scores in internal KS2 reading, writing and maths assessments; one was awarded a place at Colyton Grammar School as a result of preparation activities provided in school
- in summer 2020, disadvantaged pupils attained at or above average scores in internal KS2 reading, writing and maths assessments; one was awarded a place at Colyton Grammar School as a result of preparation activities provided in school
- in summer 2019, disadvantaged pupils attained at or above average scores in KS2 reading, writing and maths; one was awarded a place at Colyton Grammar School as a result of preparation activities provided in school
- ✓ improved self esteem, raised confidence and emotional stability: eg our 2 ELSAs, one each in KS1 and KS2, have supported more than half the disadvantaged children
- ✓ improved participation in school activities and visits: eg funding provided for school trips and sailing
- ✓ participation in extra curricular clubs and activities: provision of lunchtime clubs increased by funding TAs to run clubs
- ✓ enrichment from music tuition and clubs: as above.
